

Her job consists of providing therapy for patients suffering from life-altering conditions, such as traumatic brain injuries, strokes, etc. One of her main responsibilities is evaluating patients. Phyllis also educates and collaborates with them to create goals that will bring them towards independence in self-care, daily responsibilities, and life pursuits to return home. In therapy, she works with the patient in regaining their strength, balance, and endurance in order to participate in activities such as community mobility and cook/cleaning. She provides them with real experience by going on field trips to places such as grocery store. Phyllis performs home evaluations with the patients and caregivers to provide trainings/recommendations prior to discharge, and she attends weekly meetings with her team of therapists and other healthcare professionals to discuss each patient's plan of care.

The advice Phyllis offers to other students is to take the time to research employment opportunities and to use your resources from previous experiences. Try to shadow someone in your field and talk to people about the jobs out there. Phyllis believes extensive research and using her resources is how she landed so many interviews and job offers! She also recommends reaching out to BPU SCLP career center if you need help.

"I believe that we should create our own opportunities instead of waiting for them to show up, such as waiting for the perfect job posting. So, as I was looking for a new job, I thought why not just ask? So, I reached out to someone from my network who happens to be the Behavioral Health Network (BHN)'s Professional Development Department Director, and asked her if there were any job opportunities in her department. FYI, there were no job postings from that department. She said, "there may be one." I, then asked her if I should send her my resume, and she agreed.

I quickly emailed my Career Coach from the Sullivan Career Life and Planning Center (SCLP), Amanda Dunn, and I used her feedback to polish my resume. Then, the director scheduled an "interview." When I showed up, she said to me, "Honestly, we already know we want to hire your, this is just a conversation." I was shocked, particularly because I only have 2 months of experience in the training field. This person knows me from the BHN's Social Justice Committee that she is also a member of. She already knew some of my skills, such as public speaking, and my educational background. She already trusted me. Moreover, I also have a good relationship with her boss! We all worked together in that committee. Lesson of a lifetime: create your own opportunities and connect with people in an authentic manner. It pays off!"

Bay Path University Sophomore Wins Grand Prize for MicroBuddy Pitch; Four Students Receive Awards for Entrepreneurial Spirit

Victoria Thomas, a second-year biology student minoring in business and chemistry at Bay Path University, has been selected as a winner of the 2018 Grinspoon Entrepreneurship Initiative Award. Thomas received one of three grand prizes at the 2018 Harold Grinspoon Charitable Foundation's Entrepreneurship Initiative Banquet and Awards Ceremony for her pitch, "MicroBuddy."

Fifteen million Americans today have food allergies, and every three minutes a food allergy reaction sends someone to the emergency room. "MicroBuddy," a patented, handheld, portable test-probe device, accurately detects allergens in any type of food, and is small enough to fit in a purse, pocket, or child's school backpack.

Thomas worked closely on her pitch with Maureen McGuinness, G'12, MBA, Bay Path University Assistant Professor of Business; and Laurie A. Rosner, MBA, '99, G'08, Chair, Undergraduate Business Programs, Assistant Professor of Management, and Grinspoon El Faculty Advisor for Bay Path University.

The annual Elevator Pitch Competition was sponsored by local community banks: Berkshire Bank, Country Bank, KeyBank, PeoplesBank, United Bank and Westfield Bank. The competition was judged by representatives of each bank.

The program featured a business exhibition where 68 award-winning students from across the Valley displayed and promoted their businesses, receiving awards of up to \$1,500.00 in recognition of their entrepreneurial spirits. 
