

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Dr. Princy Quadros-Mennella: One Involved Professor

Meet Dr. Princy Quadros- Mennella, Director of the Neuroscience Program at Bay Path University, avid volunteer, working mother and role model for students at the University. Dr. Quadros-Mennella is in her sixth year at Bay Path and was the catalyst in creating the neuroscience department. She oversees the two majors under neuroscience: neurobiology and neuropsychology.

Dr. Quadros-Mennella had an interesting path to Bay Path University. As a young student at the University of Richmond, she wanted to study clinical psychology. She majored in psychology and minored in biology. She found great joy in the science side of the majors and the research aspect of the work. She earned her doctorate at UMass and worked there for four years as an Assistant Professor of Psychology. She then worked at Delaware State University for four years as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences, but knew she didn't want this as a lifetime position. When she saw that Bay Path wanted to create a neuroscience program, she applied for the position and her path brought her here.

When Dr. Quadros-Mennella is not at the helm of the neuroscience department, her passion is volunteering in a multitude of ways. She volunteers with her daughter's orchestra and is an avid member of her daughters' PTO group. The organization she is most involved with is the CISV (Children's International Summer Village). It is a leadership development program for children ages 11-18. Children from different countries travel and come together at a camp and leave their life at home behind for a while. The main mission of the organization is to educate children about other cultures, teach tolerance and diversity, meet others who may not be like them, and promote global peace. She hopes children will learn that underneath it all, we are all so much the same. She is currently planning a two week camp in Charlton, Massachusetts, where children from places like El Salvador, Brazil and Canada will join children from the United States to learn and grow together.

Dr. Quadros-Mennella collaborates with many community organizations relating to science as well. Within the community, she volunteers with groups such as the Girl Scouts, to get young girls excited about science. She also talks with parents about how important the brain is in language development. Her vast knowledge base makes her a wonderful community resource.

When I asked her about the best part of her job, she said that she enjoys working with college aged students, advising them at such a critical time in their lives, and seeing where the future takes them by staying in touch over the years. Her passion becomes theirs and she enjoys watching each student learn and grow in her care.

When I interviewed Dr. Quadros-Mennella, her passion for her work was obvious as was her passion for her own two daughters. When she is not at the University, or volunteering in the community, she can be found racing her two daughters from one event to another. She enjoys watching them grow and discovering themselves as they enter their pre-teen years. She is quite a busy lady and a role model for women of all ages.

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Elizabeth Graves: Making a Difference

Elizabeth Graves, a senior Forensic Psychology major, utilized her internship at Brain Balance Achievement Center in West Springfield, MA to learn as much as she could. Brain Balance's goal is to help children with behavioral, social, and academic concerns by strengthening the areas of the brain that are weaker through stimulations. Elizabeth's path to this internship was not a typical one. Instead of a normal one on one interview, Elizabeth's interview was with the whole group of applicants. They were given situational questions and each of them would have to explain what they would do. Elizabeth described this experience as very nerve-wracking, however, her preparation paid off and they offered her the internship.

Elizabeth began her internship working at the front office where she accomplished daily tasks such as, greeting parents, answering phone calls, and organizing paperwork. She was involved with a lot of the prep work before the children began the programs each day. She would 'gear up' the children with special equipment that stimulates the brain. After extensive observations, she learned how to be a coach and was able to engage more with the children. She would help out in the coaching rooms, where the children would do computer stimulations and practice physical tasks like using peg boards. Elizabeth really enjoyed making connections with the children.



Elizabeth is very proud of everything that Brain Balance accomplishes. She explained that there were cases where a child with Asperger's was actually taken off the spectrum after undergoing their programs and stimulations. This organization makes a huge impact on the lives of so many children and she is thrilled to be a part of it. Elizabeth's hard work paid off and she was hired as a coach to stay working on their team after her internship ended. She is currently being trained in primitive reflexes and initial assessments so she can build programs to meet each child's specific needs. This internship helped solidify her desire to work with children in the future and has helped her career path progress forward.

Kelly Bernier: Internship to Full Time Job

Kelly Bernier, a senior Psychology major, completed her internship as a Crisis Advocate for the Center for Women and Community (CWC) in Amherst, MA. This internship not only gave her the experience she needed, but also enabled Kelly to be certified as a Hampshire County Crisis Counselor. Kelly used this certification and experience to stand out among applicants and land a full time position as a Safety Assistance for Every Person Leaving Abuse Now (SAFEPLAN) Advocate with the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA). She assists survivors with obtaining restraining orders, helps with explanations of the order, and provides references, such as free attorneys, free counseling, etc. Kelly spends her days providing counseling services to emotionally support her clients as well as supporting them in court. Kelly also works with court personnel, such as court officers, victim witness unit advocates, and attorneys. The most intriguing part for Kelly is hearing survivor stories and connecting them back to the major issues surrounding sexual assault and domestic violence. Hearing these stories fuels her desire to help others and make a difference in the future.

Her advice to other students is to show your enthusiasm and use your personal experiences as tools in your career. She believes that it is okay to fill out applications that are out of your comfort zone because you never know what will happen. Kelly never thought she was going to obtain the job she did, but she utilized all of her resources and has landed a position that is going to benefit her personally, educationally, and financially for the future.


